Cognitive intervention in Semantic Dementia: maintaining words over time
What the study is about

Patients with semantic dementia (SD) experience marked difficulties in naming and understanding everyday words. These impairments impede their ability to participate in everyday household conversations, leading to frustration and social withdrawal. While there is no cure or medication available to help stop or slow the progression of this disease, research has shown that these patients can improve their naming ability through cognitive intervention. In the majority of studies, these participants demonstrate good retention one month later. Beyond this time these improvements with trained words often fade, yet no studies have investigated how to maintain performance. The aim of the current study was to investigate maintenance of words over a 6-month

period and identify how training improvements may be prolonged

What we did

Nine SD patients completed a 2-month online word training program to re-learn the name of familiar, household objects. Each program of words was tailored to the individual and included nouns from categories such as food, clothing, and household appliances. Participants were trained on two sets of words, where each set consisted of approximately 30 words. Words were trained using a basic "look, listen, repeat" procedure while viewing an online slide show that paired colour photographs of objects with the associated word. Following the end of the training period, naming performance was monitored over 6 months: firstly for 2 months without further training, followed by a further 4 months, where revision training was provided if required

What we have found

All 9 participants improved their naming immediately post-intervention ($p < .001$). After 2 months without practice, significant declines occurred in 4 participants. To sustain at least 80% of their post intervention performance 6 months later, 4 participants required minimal revision, 2 required regular revision, with the remaining 3 participants requiring no revision. During this period, group results indicated some decline in words that were initially known, but were not trained. Thus results showed that improvements in naming can be sustained in SD patients, with the support of less intense, but ongoing revision. Training words that are still known appears to help prolong memory of these words.

What next

Next steps are to convert the online program into a format that is accessible and available to patients far and wide, by building an app-based version. This version would be designed to allow families to build and modify programs themselves, providing a flexible tool for use over time.

Keynote and ½ day Morning Workshop (WS3)

Ph.D., FACRM, Associate Professor of Physical

Medicine & Rehabilitation, Baylor College of Medicine and Director, Brain Injury Research Center, TIRR Memorial Hermann, Houston, Texas, USA. Angelle M. Sander, Ph.D. is Associate Professor with tenure in the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at Baylor College of Medicine, Director of TIRR Memorial Hermann's Brain Injury Research Center, and Senior Scientist on the TIRR Research Council. She is the Project Director for the NIDRR-funded Rehabilitation Research and Training Center on Developing Strategies to Foster Community Integration and

Participation for Individuals with Traumatic Brain Injury. She is Principal Investigator for an ongoing clinical trial of contextualized memory strategy training for persons with TBI and is Co-Principal Investigator (with Dr. David Arciniegas) on a newly funded randomized controlled trial of Donepezil to improve memory functioning in persons with TBI. She is Project Co-Director for the Texas TBI Model System of TIRR and Principal Investigator of the local randomized controlled trial of Acceptance and Commitment Therapy to treat emotional distress. She has a history of federal grant funding since 1997. Her areas of specialty include cognitive and psychosocial interventions, family adjustment to TBI, community integration of persons with TBI, intimacy and sexuality after TBI, assessing and treating substance abuse in persons with TBI, and ethnic diversity in outcomes. She has over 60 published articles, book chapters, and abstracts. Dr. Sander also serves as the neuropsychologist for the inpatient rehabilitation unit at Quentin Mease Community Hospital in Harris Health System.

Prof Jan Copeland

Professor Jan Copeland (PhD, BSc Psych (Hons)) is the founding Director of the National Cannabis Prevention and Information Centre (NCPIC) at UNSW

Australia since 2007. She has worked in the addictions field for 25 years and is best known for her research developing and testing brief interventions for the management of cannabis use disorder among adults and adolescents. She has around 300 publications, half of which are in international peer-reviewed journals. She has recently written a book, with her colleagues Sally Rooke and Etty Matalon, for Allen & Unwin on cannabis that is to be released in early 2015. Her

research and translational work has attracted more than \$38M in funding. Professor Copeland has a long standing commitment to service with community agencies and is currently Chair of the Drug and Alcohol Multicultural Education Centre and a director on the Board of Management of The McGrath Foundation's Odyssey House. Among other editorial roles she is an Associate Editor of *Drug and Alcohol Dependence*. She is a member of the US College on Problems of Drug Dependence and Chairs their international research committee. Additional memberships include the Australian Psychological Society, International Cannabinoid Research Society, Australian Professional Society on Alcohol and Drugs and the International Society for Research on Internet Interventions.

A/Prof Raul Gonzalez

Dr. Gonzalez is an Associate Professor of Psychology at Florida International University (FIU) and Director of the Substance Use and HIV

Neuropsychology (SUHN) Lab. He is a faculty member of the Department of Psychology Clinical Science Program and the Center for Children and Families.

Dr. Gonzalez graduated with a degree in Clinical Psychology from the San Diego State University / University of California, San Diego Joint Doctoral Program, where he specialized in Neuropsychology and then continued to the University of Illinois at Chicago for internship, post-doc, and his first faculty position. He has approximately 15 years of experience conducting research on neurocognitive contributors and consequences of substance use and addiction among individuals with and without HIV, with a focus on cannabis. His research efforts have been generously funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse / National Institutes of Health throughout most of his career. He is Director of Continuing Education for the International Neuropsychological Society, a recent recipient of the NIDA DCNBR Outstanding Early Career Investigator Award, and serves on the editorial board

of Archives of Clinical Neuropsychology and Neuropsychology.

Professor Murat Yucel

Monash Clinical and Imaging Neuroscience, Clayton, Victoria, Australia
Prof Yucel is a Professor and Clinical Neuropsychologist and Director of MCIN.
Murat's research has

made major contributions to understanding the long-term effects of heavy substance use on the brain and behaviour (e.g., why individuals addicted to heroin find it difficult to control their impulses & repeatedly relapse), as well as the impact of drug use on mental health (e.g., links between early and heavy cannabis use & risk for psychosis). Our findings have also challenged some widespread perceptions about drug use (e.g., that cannabis has minimal effects on brain & behaviour). Our research has also made contributions to understanding the neurobiology of several psychiatric disorders including obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), schizophrenia, bipolar disorder and major depressive disorder. His discoveries have led to increased public and professional awareness on these topics and established his group at the forefront of addiction and psychiatric neuroscience research in Australia.
